RESOLVED THAT the agenda be adopted as presented.

PROCLAMATIONS/PRESENTATIONS

11-03-139 World Plumbing Day

Mayor Simms signed a proclamation declaring March 11, 2011 as World Plumbing Day in the City of Mount Pearl.

Ron Neary, Canadian Institute of Plumbing & Heating and Jack Bavis, Mechanical Contractors Association, and Sheri Slaney, Canadian Institute of Plumbing & Heating, were in attendance. Mr. Neary highlighted the importance of proper plumbing in relating to protecting the planet and its citizens.

11-03-140 <u>Presentation – Max Harvey</u>

Mayor Simms recognized the contribution of Max Harvey during his term as Chair of the Admiralty House Board of Directors.

CORRESPONDENCE

11-03-141 Appointment of an Emergency Management Planning Committee

Motion - Deputy Mayor Locke/Councillor Stoyles

<u>Whereas</u>, Section 5, Subsection (1) of the Emergency Services Act (Act) states that the council of every municipality shall, within three (3) years of this Act having come into force, adopt an Emergency Management Plan, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Section 5, Subsection (6) of the Act provides for amendments to the Act, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the City of Mount Pearl previously adopted the City of Mount Pearl Disaster Plan (Plan), and

<u>Whereas</u>, this Plan is in need of a major revision to comply with the current provisions of the Act,

<u>Therefore be it resolved that</u> the City of Mount Pearl approve the establishment of an Emergency Management Planning Committee to develop the City of Mount Pearl Emergency Management Plan and that the

Chief Administrative Officer or his designate is appointed as the Emergency Management Coordinator.

Question called. Motion carried unanimously.

11-03-142 <u>Declaration of a State of Emergency</u>

Motion - Deputy Mayor Locke/Councillor Stoyles

<u>Whereas</u> the current City of Mount Pearl Act provides the authority to declare a state of emergency to Council or the Mayor, where previously authorized by Council; and

<u>Whereas</u> the updated Municipalities Act provides such authority to the Council or the Mayor without requiring previous authorization by Council;

<u>Therefore be it resolved</u> that the City Council of the City of Mount Pearl authorize the Mayor the authority to declare

- o a state of emergency in the City or part of the City
- the closing of or the hours of operation of businesses and schools or a class of them, in the City;
- o the banning or controlling of public gatherings;
- the evacuation of buildings;
- the restriction or prohibition of the use of vehicles or a class of them on the streets of the city;
- o the restriction or prohibition of the use of water in the city; and
- o other action that the Mayor considers necessary.

<u>Discussion:</u> It was acknowledged that the draft emergency management plan is nearing completion after which it will be reviewed by internal and external representatives. Following this review, Council will be provided a detailed briefing and the document will be referred to the Fire & Emergency Services Division of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

11-03-143 <u>Tender for Plough Blades</u>

Motion - Councillor Tessier/Councillor Walsh

RESOLVED THAT the tender for the supply and delivery of 16 hydraulic reversible ploughs (blades) be awarded to the lowest qualified bidder, Toromont Cat, for the tendered price of \$266,953.01, tax included.

<u>Discussion:</u> It was noted that these blades would allow for more efficiency when clearing cul de sacs and one-way streets.

Question called. Motion carried unanimously.

11-03-144 <u>Tender for Side Loader Comingle Garbage Packer</u>

Motion – Councillor Tessier/Councillor Walsh

RESOLVED THAT the tender for the supply and delivery of one comingle garbage packer be awarded as a six-month lease to the low bidder Saunders Equipment, with the option to purchase at the end of the lease period.

<u>Discussion:</u> It was noted that the City has submitted a request to the Provincial Government for financial support for the purchase of four units.

Question called. Motion carried unanimously.

11-03-145 Trail Groomer

Residents were advised that the City has undertaken the grooming of the NL Trailway, within the boundaries of Mount Pearl, from the Paradise boundary to the City of St. John's boundary, a few hundred feet east of the crossing at Park Avenue.

In addition, trails have been groomed from the Mount Pearl/St. John's intersection to Team Gushue Park, travelling along the north side of the experimental farm as well as the trail from Powers Pond (on the west side) to Wells Crescent and the east side to the NL Trailway.

A map outlining these areas has been posted on the City website should residents wish to review the locations of the groomed trails. This venture will be evaluated at the end of the winter season to ascertain the success of our trail grooming efforts and to determine whether it is a viable venture and if there is a need to expand the areas currently being covered.

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE

11-03-146 Frosty Festival – Glacier Rental

RESOLVED THAT the rental subsidy of \$10,000 be released, as in past years, for the costs associated with the use of the Glacier for a number of Frosty Festival events.

11-03-147 Frosty Festival – 2nd & Final Installment 2011

RESOLVED THAT approval be granted for the release of the Frosty Festival operating subsidy, in the amount of \$15,000, which is the second and final installment, as noted in the current MOU.

The 29th Annual Frosty Festival was an overwhelming success from the stand point of the Frosty Festival Board of Directors, the 30+ Community Groups involved and the general public!

This year saw record crowds at the popular events including the Opening Ceremonies and Extravaganza where there were 2100 people out to experience the lighting of the Frosty Flame, and the excitement of the Extravaganza, to Frosty's Big Birthday Bash where there were over 1700 people in attendance.

Appreciation was extended to the numerous volunteers who ran events and worked long hours to ensure that the events were successful! Frosty Festival would not be able to run without the volunteers.

The Board of Directors is starting to plan for the 30th Anniversary of Frosty, and looks forward to seeing everyone out for the continued success of Frosty!

RESOLVED THAT the tender for testing of geo-thermal wells at the Reid Centre site be awarded to the lowest, qualified bidder, Pius Sullivan & Sons Limited, for the bid amount of \$33,123.69.

11-03-158 <u>Hurricane Igor storm event – update on status of repairs to infrastructure</u>

Council was advised that the latest estimates are consistent with the original forecast of \$2 million in damages sustained by the City from Hurricane Igor. To date, substantive portions of the cleanup, assessment and stabilization phases are complete. With respect to replacement and reconstruction, the larger portion of work completed has involved the replacement of numerous traffic structures and lighting systems.

Three projects remain the focus of the City's ongoing remedial plan:

- The replacement of the Greenwood Crescent Bridge
- The replacement of lights at Squires Field
- Phase I of the reconstruction of the Twin Falls trail system

11-03-159 Chrome-It Accessories

Spray Paint Booth – Discretionary Use

1277 Topsail Road

<u>Motion</u> – Deputy Mayor Locke/Councillor Aker

RESOLVED THAT approval be granted and a development permit be issued to Chrome-It Accessories to occupy approximately 93.6m² (1008 sq

ft) within the building at 1277 Topsail Road for the uses associated with mirror finishing of small parts and accessories using a water base spray system, subject to meeting the City's regulations and requirements as well as requirements of any relevant external agency or department.

11-03-160 Application – Taxicab Business

RESOLVED THAT an application for a taxi-cab business for the operation of a dispatch office at 185 Commonwealth Avenue, a four cab stand at 185 Commonwealth Avenue and a two cab stand at 7 Riverview Avenue be approved subject to their compliance with the Mount Pearl Taxi Regulations.

<u>Discussion:</u> It was noted that the main dispatch will be at the Commonwealth Avenue site. The business, Trick-o-matic, has granted permission to the applicant to operate the two cab stand at 7 Riverview Avenue.

It was confirmed that should the applicant pursue another site (in Mount Pearl), it would be referred to Council for consideration.

Councillor Stoyles advised that the Irish Pub Night, postponed during the Frosty Festival, has tentatively been rescheduled to March 20.

Councillor Walsh commented on the success of the Pancake Breakfast for the NL Housing & Homelessness Network and congratulated the CBC on their efforts for such a worthwhile cause.
